	Transportation policy and funding decisions are in such a sorry state that only a revolution will set the US on a rational, environmental and accountable path. The sunset of current federal transportation policy, SAFETEA LU, does not need to be reauthorized. A new authorization is needed focused on national performance measures and funding should be modally agnostic! CNU is in the position to help lead the revolution. UK's Oliver Cook's report on the Eddington Review inspired this notion of a new approach for US Transportation policy.
