- 1. **Network Defining, Measuring, and Sustaining:** What do we mean by network? What are its principles? What are the key characteristics of a sustainable as compared to a conventional network? What are the best ways for us to measure the performance of sustainable transportation networks across all modes and in terms of traditional and alternative measures? What contributions can a sustainable transportation network make to the issue of climate change and the energy crisis? What are the expectations, metrics, and possible research projects desired?
